WHEREAS, because the property was not demolished or made safe by September 23, 2024, the City Council held a public show cause hearing on March 10, 2025, to review the findings and the order of the Hearing Officer, and the owners were notified in writing of said hearing and had an opportunity to appear and show cause why said building should not be demolished or otherwise made safe; and

WHEREAS, this Council by resolution 2025-107, directed the owner(s) of 108 S. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd, as legally described above, to comply with the order of the Hearing Officer to demolish or otherwise make safe the said building within 60 days from the date of resolution 2025-107, April 21, 2025; and

WHEREAS, the owner of 108 S. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd, as legally described above, has subsequently presented to this Council a detailed plan and budget to make the property safe along with, proof of significant funding for such repairs; and

WHEREAS, 108. S. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd, as legally described above, is a property with significant historical value, having been designed by Kenneth C. Black.
