WHEREAS, Chapter 808 of the Lansing Codified Ordinances regulates cabaret licenses within the City of Lansing; and

WHEREAS, Energy Event Center LLC, 3222 S MLK Jr BLVD Suite 41A, Lansing, Michigan, was previously issued a cabaret license by the City of Lansing,

effective 5/19/2023; and

WHEREAS, Section 808.08 provides that a cabaret license may be revoked if the licensee “ . . . operates his or her business in violation of any other provision of this chapter, other ordinances of the City or State, or Federal Law”; and

WHEREAS, Section 808.08 further requires a hearing by City Council or its designated hearing officer before recommending the revocation of an already existing cabaret license; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Elizabeth O'Leary, acting as Lansing City Council's designated Hearing Officer pursuant to Resolution #2023-194, conducted a hearing on August 24, 2023, as required by Section 808.08; and

WHEREAS, the Licensee appeared at the revocation hearing and was provided an opportunity to be heard; and

WHEREAS, Ms. O'Leary has provided a transcript of the hearing, findings of fact, and recommendation to City Council, pursuant to the requirements of Section 808.08.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Lansing, has been fully informed of the Hearing Officer's findings of fact and proposed recommendation revocation of Licensee's cabaret license for violations of Chapter 808 of the Lansing Codified Ordinances.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, The City Council of the City of Lansing, hereby modifies the Hearing Officer's proposed findings of fact and recommendation. The revocation is effective immediately.

**Resolution #2023-232**

By the Committee of the Whole

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Lansing

WHEREAS, the Charter of the City of Lansing requires the Council to adopt an annual statement of Budget Policies and Priorities serving to guide the Administration in developing and presenting the Fiscal Year 2024/2025 Budget; and

WHEREAS, the City Council established the following Mission;

The City of Lansing's mission is to ensure quality of life by:

- I. Promoting a vibrant, safe, healthy and inclusive community that provides opportunity for personal and economic growth for residents, businesses and visitors,
- II. Securing short- and long-term financial stability through prudent management of city resources,
- III. Providing reliable, efficient and quality services that are responsive to the needs of residents and businesses,
- IV. Adopting sustainable practices that protect and enhance our cultural, natural and historical resources,
- V. Facilitating regional collaboration and connecting communities; and

WHEREAS, the standing committees of the City Council have met to evaluate the budget and recommend an annual statement of budget policies and priorities to guide the Administration in developing and presenting the Fiscal Year 2024/2025 budget.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Lansing City Council has established the following as its Fiscal Year 2024/2025 Budget Policies and Priorities and requests that the Administration review them and encourages that they, to the extent practical, be included in the Administration's budget presented due to the City Council by the fourth Monday in March 2024.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Committee of the Whole has established the following priorities:

1. \$100,000: (1) FTE focus specifically on housing legal assistance for tenants and homeowners in the City.
2. Fund sidewalk repair by \$200,000 for a total of \$600,000, with a priority placed on underserved areas.
3. Fund local street repair funding by \$1.7 million for a total of \$7 million, with a priority placed on underserved areas.
4. Funding for GED prep and passage program.
5. Sustainability; \$134,000 Funding for marketing, training, professional development, needed risk assessments and updated plans, along with an additional part-time employee.
6. \$400,000: Funding for additional staff arborists and equipment in forestry to more efficiently survey and maintain tree inventory consisting of hundreds of thousands of trees in what is known as a USA City of Trees.
7. \$75,000; Feasibility Study for a community center located in southeast Lansing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Committee on Development and Planning has established the following priorities:

1. \$80,000: (1) FTE LEDC; RE: Focus on Small Business, Minority Businesses; Female Owned Businesses
2. \$250,000: Increase funding for the Façade Improvement Grant Program
3. Analysis of Façade Improvement Grant Program to include Return on Equity Report on Previous Façade Grants provided to small businesses including a statistical breakdown of what wards have been impacted by the program.
  - a. It's requested that this report be submitted to City Council no later than March 1, 2024.
4. \$40,000: Initiate an RFP for Engagement of Stakeholders and Completion of Community Facilities Plan, including school and county buildings, complete with inventory of assets and goals/objectives for facilities, that will serve as the basis for community facility decisions into the future.
5. \$80,000: (1) FTE compliance employee to ensure all development agreements are being followed including but not limited to: income tax collection, TIFAs, PILOTS, and Brownfields.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Committee on Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion has established the following priorities:

1. The City of Lansing will include in their FY2024/2025 Budget public safety planning, a commitment, support, and a partnership with Advance Peace which will help lives and reduce the life altering trauma experienced by people living in the impacted communities and by the service providers who support them, including law enforcement. Council asks the Administration to focus the budget allocations to fully fund the City portion for FY2024/2025.
2. \$80,000: (1) FTE Human Resources Employee; RE: Focus on DEI in the hiring process to work towards having a workforce that reflects the diversity of the City of Lansing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Committee on Public Safety has established the following priorities:

1. Zoning Personnel Staff for Administrative tasks relating to Commercial Corridor Specialist.
2. Portable Speed Bumps (Public Service Department)
3. Reinstate the LFD apprenticeship/intern program (Lansing Fire Department)
4. Economic Development and Planning:
  - a. Dedicate resources to searching appropriate databases for non-homestead ownership.
  - b. Implement a pilot program to incentivize landlords to accept Section 8 vouchers

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Committee on Ways and Means has established the following priorities:

1. Continue to explore new municipal incentives under the Inflation Recovery Act to invest in solar energy for City facilities.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Ad Hoc on Homelessness & Solutions 2023 has established the following priorities:

1. Economic Development and Planning:
  - a. Developing a comprehensive plan with HRCS and CoC to ensure that grant dollars are being utilized as intended with outcomes that can be defined and qualitative.
  - b. Complete the study of existing rental fees to ensure they are sufficient and consistent to meet the rigorous needs for safety housing with communities of similar size.
  - c. Create a landlord registry either through the BS&A portal or other platform that is publicly accessible that shows housing inspections and the status (i.e., in compliance, red tags and compliance).
2. HRCS
  - a. Required DEI training by an outside organization to those provider agencies receiving HRCS funds who help the homeless, people with disabilities and other vulnerable populations.
  - b. Through the Housing Ombudsman prepare education materials for renters. Included but not limited to:
    - i. Rights as a renter
    - ii. Know before you sign a lease
    - iii. District Court Eviction Court information
    - iv. Conduct at least two housing fairs in City with MSU Law each year
    - v. Creation of a brochure by the Administration on where tenants can go for assistance if they are forced to relocate due to red tags or violations by the landlord.
  - c. Utilizing all the Community Centers in the different areas of Lansing as warming and cooling centers during heat and cold events. This would require funding for after-hours operations, for security, staff and other expenses that may be included.
3. Law/Courts
  - a. Support the creation of a Community Court with 54-A District Court and continued support for eviction diversion program.
  - b. Implement policy where Nuisance Actions filed against recalcitrant landlords enabling City Attorney to enter into voluntary compliance agreements.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the City Council would like to continue its commitment, if funding is available, to:

- Maintain and improve the City's infrastructure;
- Preserve and ensure clean, safe, well-maintained housing and neighborhoods;
- Provide comprehensive and affordable recreational programs and youth and family services;
- Explore alternatives for improved efficiency in service and delivery.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the City Council has accepted the following recommendations from the 2023 Board of Public Service for FY 2024/2025:

1. Increase general fund support for implementation of the City's Street System Asset Management Plan, with a priority placed on reconstructing and preserving neighborhood streets, especially in those areas of the city which have been historically underserved. We encourage the Department to continue utilizing new and innovative ways to extend the life of our existing streets;
2. Maintain and expand funding for sidewalk repairs and right-of-way maintenance and improvement, with a priority placed on underserved areas; this should all be done while keeping safety a priority for Lansing residents and visitors, and meeting or exceeding the compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act;
3. Maintain and expand funding to update and improve the fleet of city vehicles, with specific priority for the Department;
4. Establish Lansing as a leader in water quality, including PFAS regulation, testing, monitoring, enforcement and reducing other forms of water pollution in the city, through maintaining and increasing funding for educational and training purposes, and working relevant federal, state, county and local governments and non-government organizations;
5. Expand opportunities for multi-family residential and business recycling;
6. Follow recommendations (to the greatest extent feasible) of the energy audit of all facilities and properties to save on energy and cut costs by replacing wasteful devices with ones that are energy efficient and reduce the carbon footprint of the City of Lansing.

WHEREAS, projected State Revenues have been adjusted to the latest revenue sharing estimates as published by Michigan's Senate Fiscal Agency and stable funding of Local Community Share (PPT) reimbursements; and

WHEREAS, the operating and personnel budgets of many departments were reduced in the adoption of the Fiscal Year 2023/2024 budget in anticipation of using prior year savings made available at this time through an improved revenue outlook relative to budget; and

WHEREAS, the City it is initiating a broader review of expenditure savings and revenue improving initiatives including the review of major contracts and City services including personnel, opportunities for internal and external cost recovery, and the management of City assets and reserves; and

WHEREAS, as a result of increased enforcement of unsafe properties, there remains a need to provide temporary hotel accommodation for families temporarily displaced in the Community; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the following FY 2023/2024 budget amendment is approved:

**Ordinance #1320**

An ordinance of the City of Lansing, Michigan to amend the Lansing Codified Ordinances by amending Chapter 288 Section 288.21. Define responsibilities, functions, and reporting timelines to the City Council at a public meeting.

THE CITY OF LANSING ORDAINS:

Section 1. That Chapter 288, Section 288.21 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Lansing, Michigan, be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

c) **Responsibilities and Functions. Review departments for efficiencies, redundancies, continuity of services, and cost savings. Make recommendations on how to reduce costs and generate revenues in the future for the City of Lansing. Policy recommendations, including those in (c), may include but are not limited to:**

(1) long term financial forecasts

(2) consult with city finance director and actuary for the police and fire retirement board and employee retirement services retirement board on financial management practices

(3) Administration's strategic planning and execution efforts.

(d) Recommendations. In recognition of the provisions set forth in Charter Sections 3-207.1, 3-207.2, and 3-207.3 wherein the City Council is the policy making body for the City of Lansing and "shall have all of the rights appropriate to City legislators as established by this Charter or by statute, including the right to make inquiries of City officers and employees and receive specific information in response" and further that "the responsibilities and activities shall be to establish policy of the City and shall be legislative in nature," and, stating further, in recognition that the Mayor is the administrator of the City and employees and "except as may otherwise be provided by law or this Charter, the administrative activities of the City Council and its members shall be limited to its own staff and they shall give no direct orders to any other City officer or employee", the City Council and the Mayor, or mayoral designee, and the Chief Strategy Officer **shall meet and conference with the City Council in March and September and** ~~shall conference on~~ a mutually agreeable regular schedule to review any policy recommendations of the Chief Strategy Officer

Section 2. All ordinances, resolutions or rules, parts of ordinances, resolutions or rules in consistent with the provisions are repealed.

Section 3. Should any section, clause or phrase of this ordinance be declared to be invalid, the same shall not affect the validity of the ordinances as a whole, or any part thereof other than the part so declared to be invalid.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect on the 30<sup>th</sup> day after enactment unless given immediate effect by City Council, and shall expire December 31, 2032
