WHEREAS, Emeritus Pastor Angelene Lois Trice was born in Villa Ridge, Illinois and comes from a long lineage of pastors and ministers in the Gospel, including her father, who founded the church Faith Temple COGIC in Jackson, Michigan; and

WHEREAS, nearly a decade after marrying her husband, the late Eld. Larry M. Trice, Sr. and having 4 children, she and her family moved to Lansing, Michigan. Soon after, her husband was ordained as Senior Pastor of Pentecostal Outreach COGIC in 1976 where she served faithfully as First Lady for 24 years; and

WHEREAS, Pastor Angelene Trice was instrumental in growing the ministry and developing a love for God's people, she also visited hospitals, jails, brought food to the hungry, and prayed for people in the streets. After the passing of her husband, she was ordained Senior Pastor of Pentecostal Outreach in 2000, becoming the first woman pastor in her church's denominational jurisdiction; and

WHEREAS, in her role as Senior Pastor, Angelene expanded outreach ministries, personal and family development, and spiritual education. She completed the LMTS Outreach Center project, creating a safe place in the community for babies and children to be cared for, teens and adults to enjoy recreational activities, and families to receive the food and resources they needed; and

WHEREAS, in 2005, she retired from pastoring and transitioned leadership to her son, Pastor Larry M. Trice, Jr. Even after retirement, she remained active in the ministry, serving on the Board of Directors and teaching the Word of God to a new generation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Lansing City Council wishes to recognize Emeritus Pastor Angelene Lois Trice and the dedication of her time and life serving the ministry and the people of Lansing, Michigan. Emeritus Trice's legacy is one that will be remembered for her faithfulness to God, and her love and generosity towards her church, her family, and her community.

WHEREAS, in 2006 in an effort to promote economic development in qualifying communities, the Michigan Legislature passed Act 501 of the Public Acts of 2006, being Section 521a of the Michigan Liquor Control Code of 1998, being MCL 436.1521a, which established the criteria for Development District or Area Liquor Licenses; and

WHEREAS, through the provisions of Public Act 501 of 2006, as amended ("Act") the Michigan Liquor Control Commission (LCC) may issue new public on-premises liquor licenses in order to allow cities to enhance the quality of life for their residents and visitors to their communities; and

WHEREAS, the issuance of a Development District Liquor License under Section 521a(1)(b) of the Act requires a proposed licensed premises to be located in one of the development districts or areas listed in MCL 436.1521a(1)(b); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Public Act 120 of 1961 for Principal Shopping Districts, the Lansing City Council created the Lansing Principal Shopping District by Resolution in 1996 which is listed as a qualifying development district or area under MCL 436.1521a(1)(b); and

WHEREAS, the City of Lansing received a request from MACOTTA CLUB, LLC ("Applicant") regarding its intention to apply to the Michigan Liquor Control

Commission for a new Class C Development District or Area Liquor License for its business located at 300 S. Washington Square, Lansing, MI 48933 ("Proposed Licensed Premises") which is located within the Lansing Principal Shopping District; and

WHEREAS, the Applicant has affirmed that the Proposed Licensed Premises meets the statutory requirements for a Development District or Area Liquor License under the Act including 1) that its business must be engaged in activities of dining, entertainment, or recreation, and 2) the licensed business must be open to the general public and have a seating capacity of not less than 25 persons; and

WHEREAS, the Applicant will provide evidence with its application that it can document the expenditure to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission, of not less than \$75,000.00 in the rehabilitation or restoration of the building that will house the licensed premises over a period of the preceding five (5) years or a commitment for a capital investment of at least that amount in the building that houses the licensed premises, which must be expended before the issuance of the license, as required by the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Committee on City Operations met on February 21, 2024, to review the request with affirmative action taken;

WHEREAS, the Applicant has been informed that licensure of the Proposed Licensed Premises will be subject to approval by the Michigan Liquor Control Commission.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that City Council recommend for the reasons stated above that the Michigan Liquor Control Commission consider the request from MACOTTA CLUB, LLC, for a new Class C License issued under the provisions of MCL 436.1521a(1)(b) for its business located at 300 S. Washington Square, Lansing, MI 48933.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the City Council affirms that the Proposed Licensed Premises, 300 S. Washington Square, Lansing, MI 48933 is within the established boundaries of the Lansing Principal Shopping District; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the City Council directs the City Assessor to verify via an Affidavit the total amount of public and private investment in real and personal property within the Lansing Principal Shopping District amounts to \$200,000.00 or more over the preceding 5 years.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Applicant meets the qualifications of Lansing's City Liquor Ordinances, and those required under MCL 436.1521a(1)(b) and that the license is approved "Above all others."

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, the City Council directs the City Clerk to complete the Local Governmental Unit Approval Form (LCC-106) for the specific license approval of a New Class C license issued under MCL 436.1521a(1)(b) and to forward a copy of the certified form and this resolution to MACOTTA CLUB, LLC, and the Michigan Liquor Control Commission.

WHEREAS, the City of Lansing Department of Public Service and the Lansing Board of Water & Light are partnering to construct the utility and infrastructure improvements associated with the Combined Sewer Overflow (CSO) 016/017 Phase 2 Project, a project area generally bounded by Douglas Avenue on the northside, N Larch Street on the eastside, Beaver Street on the southside, and Seager Street on the westside; and

WHEREAS, the large amount of construction required for this project will encompass all of the 2024 construction season and all of the 2025 construction season; and

WHEREAS, the construction contractor, Hoffman Bros., Inc., is required to complete removal and replacement of utilities under the CSX Railroad Tracks in E. North Street, which will require a continuous operation until the work is complete; and

WHEREAS, this project includes a significant amount of utility work and other improvements on the local neighborhood streets within the project area and on major streets, E. North Street and Turner Road; and

WHEREAS, for the periods April 13, 2024, through November 16, 2024, and March 15, 2025, through November 1, 2025 the construction contractor, Hoffman Bros., Inc., has requested a waiver of the noise ordinance on Saturdays from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM; and

WHEREAS, the City of Lansing Public Service Department recommends that the contractor be granted the requested noise waiver in order to:

- reduce the amount of time local access for property owners is impacted;
- allow the contractor to have the ability to work some Saturdays when necessary for completion of important work activities; and
- keep the project on-schedule based on rain days.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that a public hearing be held on Monday, March 11, 2024, at 7:00 PM in the City of Lansing Council Chambers, 124 W. Michigan Ave., in consideration of the request for granting a waiver of the noise ordinance to Hoffman Bros., Inc., while the company is conducting work as part of the CSO 016/017 Phase 2 Project on Saturdays from 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM for the periods April 13, 2024, through November 16, 2024, and March 15, 2025, through November 1, 2025.

WHEREAS, Michigan Public Act 325 of 2018 requires local road agencies to develop and submit an asset management plan to the Transportation Asset Management Council (TAMC) including an asset inventory, performance goals, risk of failure analysis, anticipated revenues and expenses and performance outcomes to be submitted to TAMC; and

WHEREAS, local road agencies responsible for 100 or more certified miles of road, based on the 2017 PA 51 Mileage Certification, including all 83 Michigan counties and 39 Michigan cities are required to submit their completed asset management plans in designated phases beginning October 1, 2020; and

WHEREAS, the City of Lansing Public Service Department has completed a Transportation Asset Management Plan containing the required information; and

WHEREAS, the City of Lansing Public Service Department has updated the Transportation Asset Management Plan in 2023; and

WHEREAS, the TAMC requires a resolution accepting the updated Asset Management Plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council hereby accepts the 2023 Transportation Asset Management Plan; and

To register to speak electronically on legislative matters at a regularly scheduled or special meeting of the City Council or Committee of the Whole, a member of the public may send a request to the City Clerk no later than four (4) hours prior to the meeting in a form and manner determined by the City Clerk. Prior to the meeting, the City Clerk will email the member of the public instructions to participate.

City Council office staff will post, with agendas of all other Committees of City Council, instructions on how members of the public may attend and speak electronically on legislative matters.

The City Clerk will establish and maintain procedures and protocols for electronic participants, consistent with this rule and technologies being utilized for electronic participation. The procedures and protocols will be available for viewing by any person wishing to register for electronic participation.

The Presiding Officer of City Council, Committee of the Whole, or any other Committee of City Council may reduce the amount of time allowed for each speaker if he or she has determined that the number of registered speakers is so numerous that the meeting cannot be timely concluded without a reduction in the time allocated for each speaker.

The Rules of Decorum for Meetings, at Rule 18, apply to members of the public participating electronically. The Presiding Officer reserves the right to mute and end the comment of anyone who violates this rule.
