Ms. Paxton noted there was a \$40,000 grant awarded in 2019, and since that work over those years, they were asked to be a faculty member on this newest grant. At the time they did not believe the City was going to be paid for the privilege, and will accept this \$10,000 to offset Ms. Paxton costs.

RESOLUTION – Grant Acceptance; Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund (MNRTF) Grant; Frances River Lot Deck Improvements

Mr. Kaschinske distributed a site plan of the location. This is not acceptance of an award, but permission to apply. The DNR does require the Council to authorize the City to apply for grants from the State, due April 1, 2024. This project is along Grand River and Moores River Drive. The City did apply and receive a grant 25 years ago, and this is a rehab of the project, not new. On the east and west ends of the parking lot are wood decks, and so they are looking to change to TREX or concrete. In the project will also be improving the railings and looking at the cost of pavement on the trail surrounding the areas. This could require tree removal due to rooting in the trail. The maximum grant would be \$400,000 with a 26% match from the City and any more above that would come from the City, and the funds would come from the park millage. Council Member Spadafore asked if they can use County fund grants for the match and Mr. Kaschinske confirmed. Mr. Kaschinske added they are looking in the staff training on fowl monitoring.

MOTION BY COUNCIL MEMBER CARTER APPROVE THE RESOLUTION FOR THE GRANT ACCEPTANCE; MNRTF GRANT FOR FRANCES RIVER LOT DECK IMPROVEMENTS.

Re: 2023 State of Michigan Revitalization and Placemaking (RAP) Grant Application

Councilmembers:

The City of Lansing has applied for more than \$9 million from the Michigan Economic Development Corporation's Revitalization and Placemaking (RAP) Grant Program. Of that total, \$950,000 is budgeted for City of Lansing project management costs.

If awarded, funds will be distributed as follows:

1. The Iris (900 Block W. Saginaw St.): \$1,000,000
2. South Waverly (3700 S. Waverly Rd.): \$1,000,000
3. Child and Family Charities (401 W. Greenlawn Ave.): \$1,000,000
4. Prudden Wheel Lofts (700 May St.): \$3,200,000
5. ROECO (3131 E. Michigan Ave): \$1,800,000
6. Allen Place Co-Op: \$1,500,000

The City of Lansing's RAP application is a comprehensive effort to address the economic impacts that the region has experienced as a result of the pandemic. The projects selected represent a broad range of economic development opportunities. Each project was selected based on the current stage of development, acquisition of resources and funding, and project readiness. RAP grant dollars represent the "last dollar in" for each of the projects.

The Iris project is a full historic rehabilitation of dilapidated and vacant buildings along Saginaw Highway on Lansing's west side; a prominent regional corridor. The proposed project includes the creation of 10 new attainable residential units aimed at addressing the "Missing Middle" housing gap, as well as over 11,000 square feet of rehabilitated commercial space that will offer career training opportunities, refugee employment support, and childcare access through a partnership with a locally owned and operated learning center.

The blighted 25,960 square foot shopping center located at 3700 S Waverly Rd. has a high vacancy rate but significant potential to serve as a catalyst for corridor revitalization. The proposed project aims to provide vital community services including workforce development and behavioral health. This project also aims to create opportunities for community investment to help residents grow their wealth in assets. The Waverly Holmes Center will include a commissary commercial kitchen, cafe, a community hub, working space, an outdoor community kiosk, an outdoor farmers market, weekly education & training courses and workshops, expansion of a childcare center, and more.

In March of 2022, the current property was vacated when the hospital relocated to the newly constructed McLaren Hospital and medical center campus. Child and Family Services will use three buildings for substance abuse screenings and treatment, mental health assessments, multiple modalities of treatment interventions, including trauma treatments such as Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT), and Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing Therapy (EMDR). Additionally, behavioral health and prevention services will include vocational counseling, play therapy, group treatment, and parenting support and classes. The Meerman and Administration Buildings are connected to each other, including the mechanical systems (gas, steam, and water). The project includes separating these buildings from the main hospital's infrastructure so they can be developed for use by Child and Family Charities.

An adaptive reuse of a former factory and currently vacant building along the Saginaw St. Corridor. The Prudden project aids in eliminating the housing shortage in the city by developing 134 units and rehabilitating 70,000 square feet of obsolete industrial property. Furthermore, this project targets sustainability objectives outlined in the Living Building Challenge from the Living Future Institute to empower the community through sustainable development.

The ROECO project is a redevelopment of an immense commercial property; bringing back to life a vacant, blighted building. The core focus of this development is creating a destination for community members of all ages. ROECO will be made up of numerous retailers, restaurants, and entertainment venues surrounding a large outdoor gathering space for visitors to work, play, eat and socialize. Located on a main thoroughfare, the proposed redevelopment will serve as a bridge between Lansing and East Lansing, Michigan State University and the Capitol, while increasing walkability to the surrounding developments and communities.

Starting in 2019, the Allen Neighborhood Center (ANC) has turned the once obsolete and vacant set of buildings on the 1600 block of Kalamazoo St. into Allen Place, an \$11 million, multi-use development to serve their neighbors. Allen Place includes 21 mixed income apartments, a Federally Qualified Health Center, a food Co-Op, and a shared-use kitchen to support local food entrepreneurs. ANC has demonstrated the ability to manage complex development financing



and construction projects. As part of the creation of Allen Place, ANC received a brownfield rehabilitation grant from the Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy. Part of that funding was used to remediate lead and asbestos in a 4,000 square foot former office space above the Neighborhood Center. This space was not otherwise part of the Allen Place development, and it is currently vacant, ready to be developed. ANC has a vision of partnering with a local housing Co-Op organization to develop an apartment Co-Op in that vacant space above the Neighborhood Center. This Co-Op would provide affordable housing to Lansing's Eastside, population, and tax revenue growth for the region, and will rehabilitate an otherwise vacant and obsolete space.

The Mayor believes that this package of projects is the best use of RAP funds and addresses the diverse needs of our community. Please let me know if you have any questions.

WHEREAS, the City of Lansing received requests from a broad range of economic development opportunities to be included in the City's RAP 2.0 Program subgrant proposal; and

WHEREAS, projects were selected for the subgrant proposal based on their current stage of development, acquisition of resources and funding, and project readiness; and

WHEREAS, as stated in a Letter of Interest (LOI) dated March 29, 2024, MEDC anticipated a possible recommendation for an award under the RAP 2.0 Program in the form of a subgrant, in the amount of up to \$6,450,000; and

WHEREAS, the City of Lansing anticipates supporting five (5) development projects with the RAP 2.0 subgrant award, contingent on the final terms and conditions of the MEDC grant agreement and each project meeting the grant requirements.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Lansing City Council authorizes the administration to accept the grant funds associated with the proposed RAP 2.0 Program administered by MEDC, subject to the terms of the grant agreement.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, the Administration is authorized to create appropriate accounts and to make the necessary operating transfers for the expenditure and control of the balance of the grant funds, and to execute any necessary agreements upon approval as to form by the City Attorney.

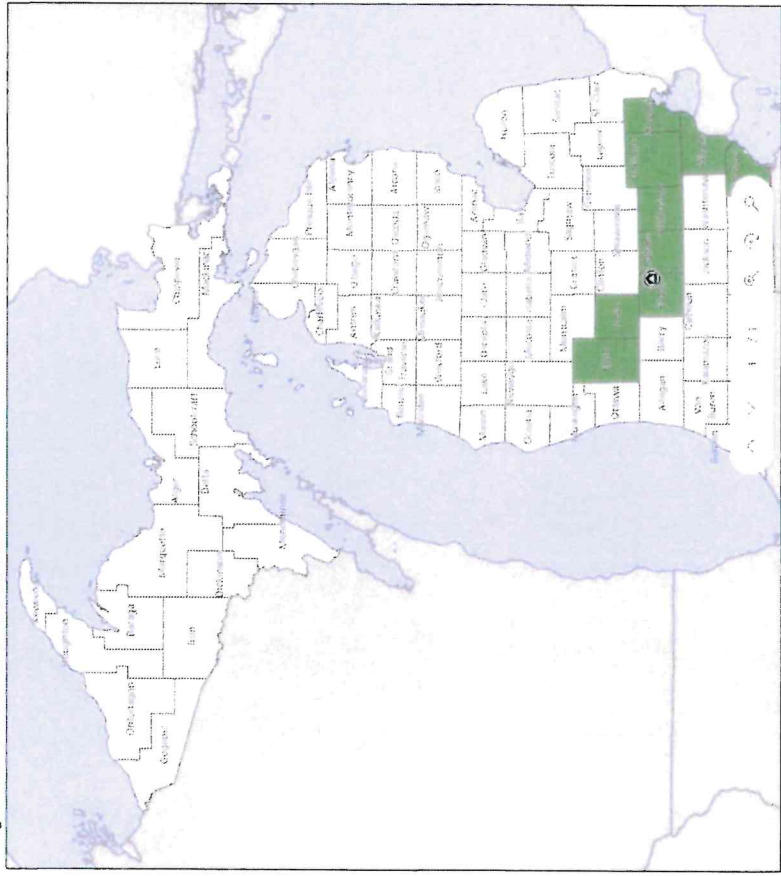

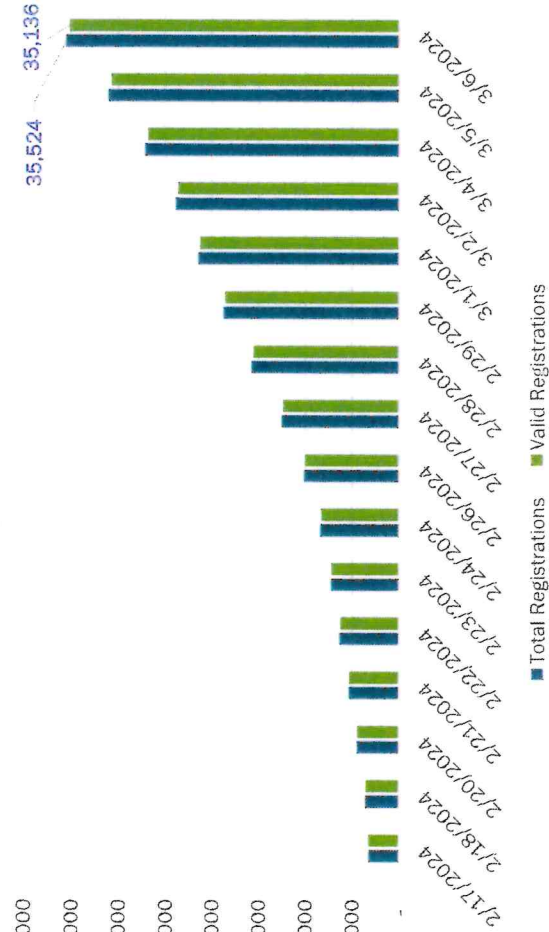

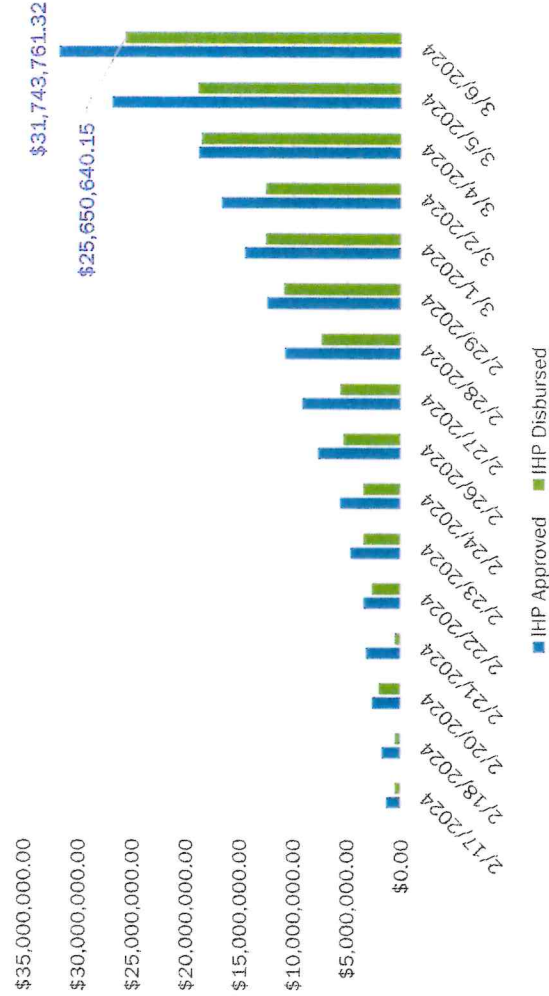

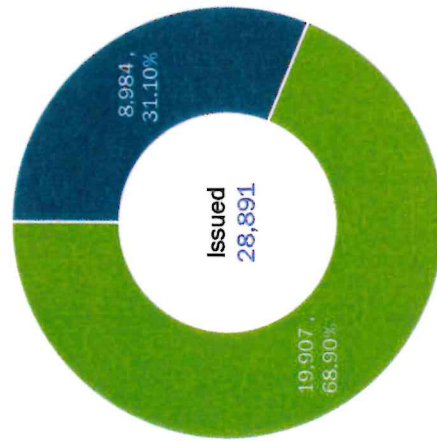

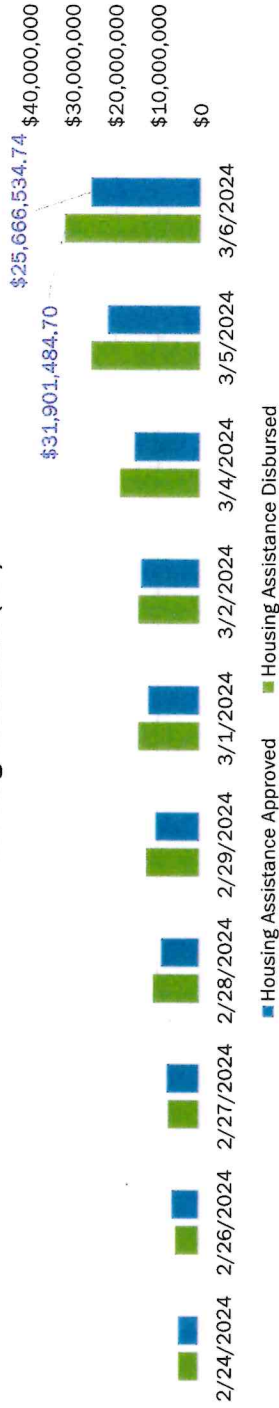

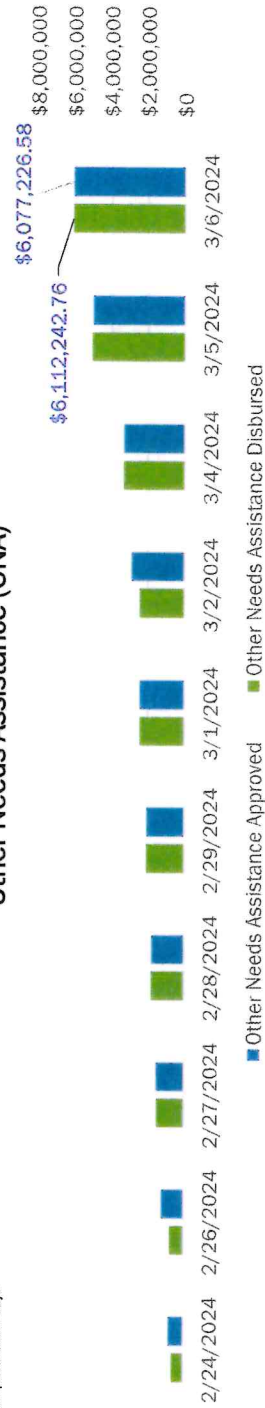

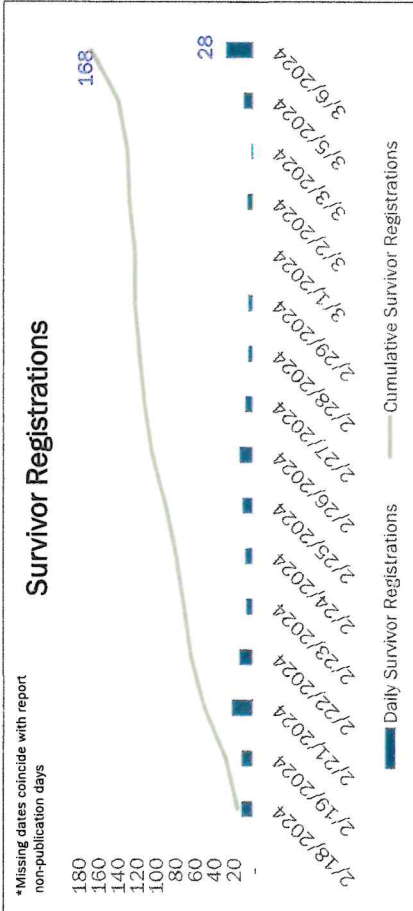

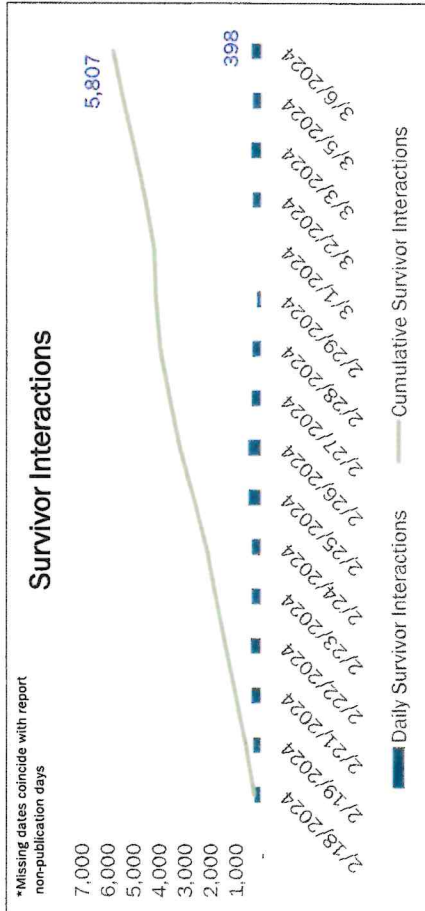

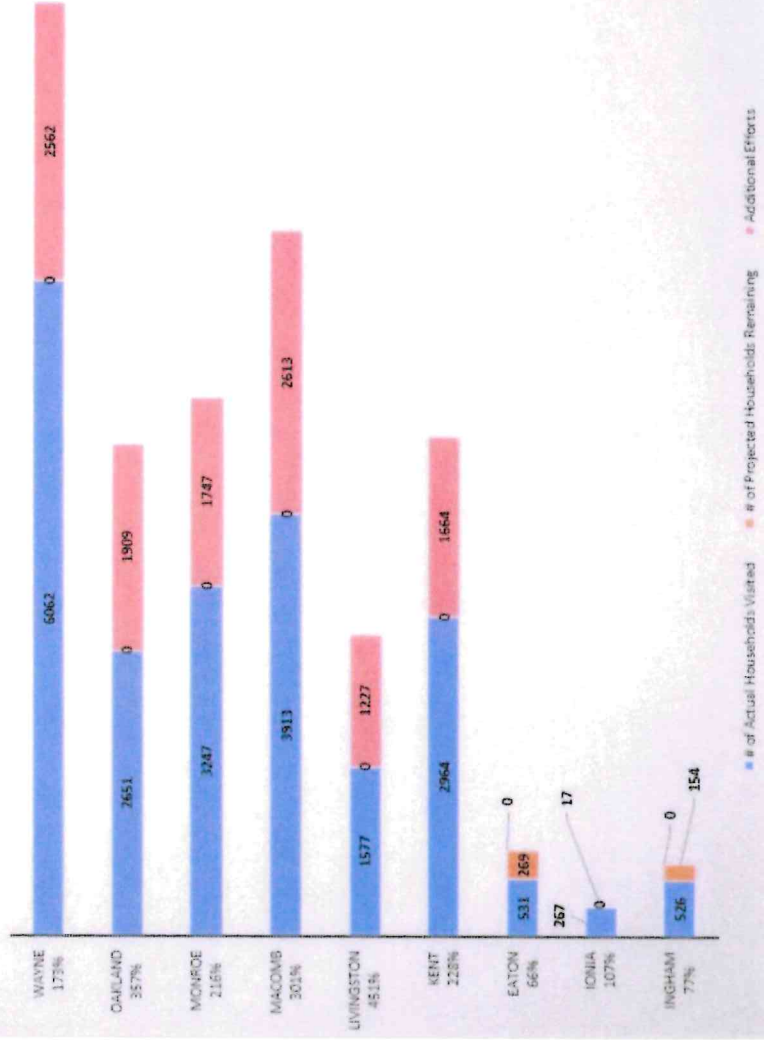

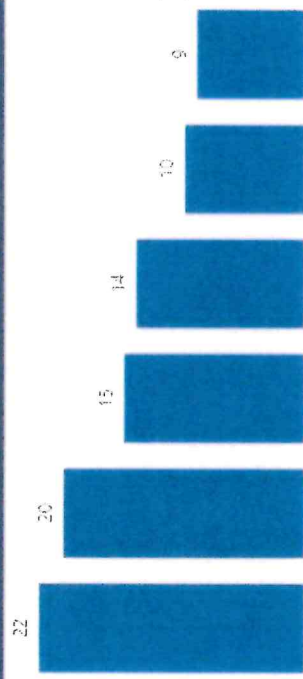

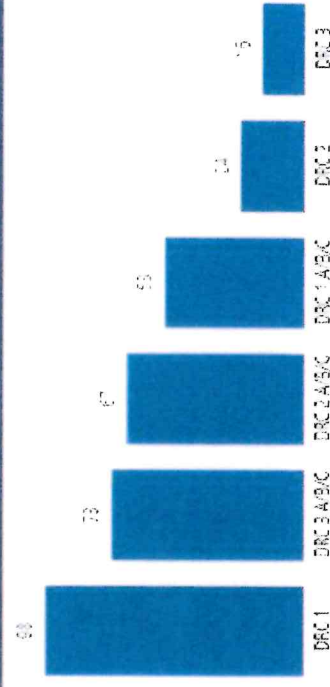

Weekly Interactions by Location

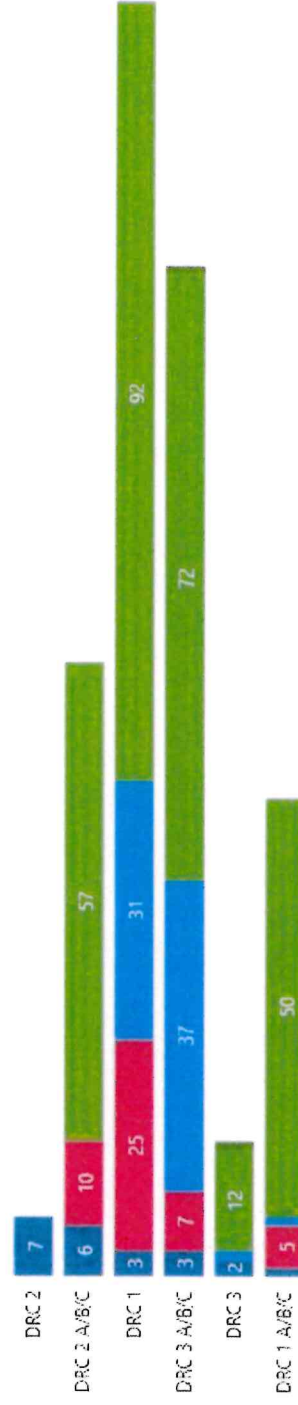


Cumulative Interactions by Location

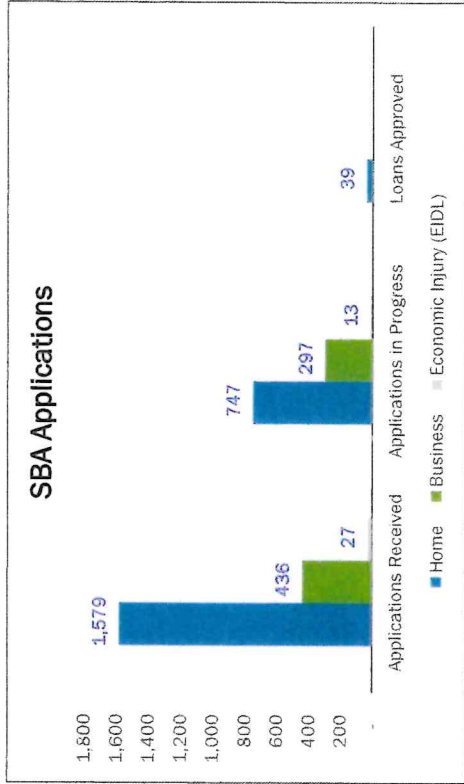
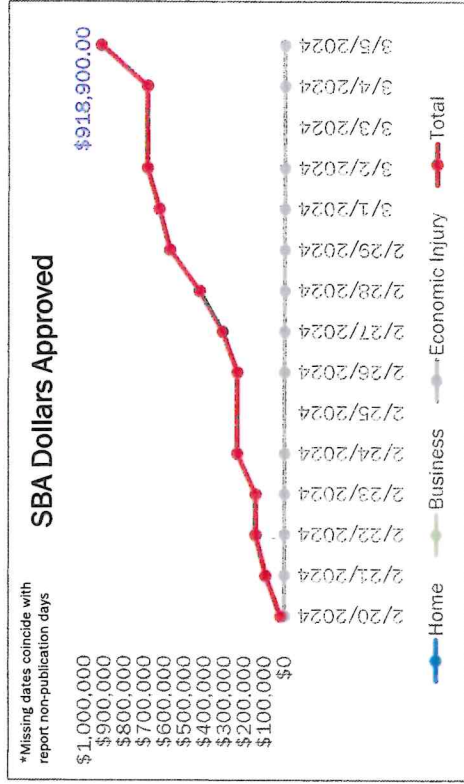
